

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT

Welcome to the 2023 school year. It has been a hot start to the year, with a cold change thrown in, and I appreciate the manner in which our students have utilized the shade we have available during recess and lunch breaks to keep cool. If it becomes extremely hot, we will open theHall with air-conditioning during the breaks for students. I have explained to the students that they need to keep hydrated and cool in the heat. Drinking water and wearing hats and sunscreen are vital to keep ourselves safe in this weather.

Sad passing of a member of staff: We were very sad by the news our Special Education teacher, Mr Colin Benson, unexpectedly passed away during the school holidays. Our condolences to his family and friends at this very sad time.

Welcome Year 7: Welcome to all our new Year 7 students and their families, our new families and all our returning students and their families. I was absolutely delighted to see the happy smiling faces of our year 7 students last Tuesday! They were all in perfect school uniform and eager to learn. Ms Kemp is supported by Mrs Tanya MacGregor who is supporting our students as the Year 7 Learning and Support Teacher. Mrs Debra Slack-Smith is the Deputy Principal overseeing Year 7. They had a lovely time having our photo taken by Mrs Morrissey on the stairs with our Year 12 students wishing them well. Our staff are very pleased with the positive attitude and the mature manner in which the students have commenced high school. Our Year 7 SRC representatives will be announced next week.

Parkes Elvis Festival: I hope everyone had a restful holiday break and enjoyed the delights of our very own Parkes Elvis Festival. Parkes High School students were involved in many activities this year and won several categories throughout the busy week of events. Parkes High School staff were also involved in events and in volunteering.

Great start to the new School year: We have had a very settled start to the school year with our students and staff working together to enhance teaching and learning throughout the school. We are delighted to have a large number of new enrolments and our students are very welcoming and helpful to our new students.

Welcome new staff: We welcome our new Deputy Principal Inclusion, Ms Catherine Coates, who has moved from Sydney to Parkes. Ms Coates is a very keen golfer and has a number of trophies in her cabinet! We also welcome our new PDHPE teacher, Ms Ebony Kingston, Science teacher, Ms Courtney Hodges-Lockwood, English teacher, Ms Amy McAlister, Special Education teacher, Mr Hugh Wood and School Psychologist, Ms Emily Kelly.

School Chaplain: Our School Chaplain, Mr Chris Pridham has been able to extend his time supporting our students and is now on-site Monday, Tuesday, Thursday and Friday. We are currently recruiting for a new Student Support Officer, SSO.

Relieving Year Advisor for Year 11: Mr Alex Rogers is relieving Head Teacher Mathematics as we recruit for this position. Mr Warren Murray will look after Year 11 while Mr Rogers is relieving Head Teacher Mathematics.

Breakfast Club: We are very excited that our Breakfast Club will continue five days per week. Thank you to Mrs Bec James for her coordination and to all the staff who volunteer their time to support this great program. We thank our local businesses, including Woolworths for their kind donations of food.

Safety: Our Health and Safety directorate (HS) requires parents and carers of students who need to have medication at school to bring the medication to the front office in Webster packs (see your chemist). This must be done by an adult. All students taking medication at school must have a health care plan which has been discussed with the principal. Please do not allow your child to bring aerosols to school. We have several students and staff who are allergic to the aerosol spray and both staff and students had to be taken to hospital by ambulance due to the allergic reaction. Vapes are not to be brought to school under any circumstances. Vapes are dangerous to your health and it is illegal to sell them to anyone under 18 years of age. Once over 18 years of age, people must have them prescribed by a medical professional to help them give up smoking and they are intended only for that person.

Year 12 of 2022: Congratulations to our very successful Year 12 class of 2022. The outstanding HSC results indicate our students had taken on board feedback from their teachers and embedded this into their next task and examinations. Our students were also successful in gaining early entry to the following universities: Charles Sturt, New England, Canberra, Newcastle, Sydney, NSW and Wollongong. Many of our students have already secured employment as well as TAFE options. The students all spoke very highly of the extra time and effort our staff spent with them before, during and after school and on weekends and during holidays. The students said this extra time and support gave them more confidence as they went into their examinations and asked me to pass on their gratitude to the staff. Several students have also let us know that they have been successful in gaining scholarships to support them financially while studying at university.

PRINCIPAL'S REPORT continued

School Expectations: I have spoken to our students and explained that our school expectations are they will be safe, respectful and responsible at school. I have also explained that this year my priorities with the student body are high expectations, attendance, achievement in literacy and numeracy and our student learning culture.

High Expectations: Our high expectations of students continue as we work to continually deliver quality learning to our students. We expect students to be ready to learn as they enter the classroom. When students line up prior to entering the class under their teacher's instructions, put their hat, phone and earphones in their bags, they are ready to focus on their teacher and the instructions given once settled in class. This allows the students to listen and concentrate on the tasks set by the teacher as it removes distractions. It also allows the teachers to have more time to teach and conduct one on one support as they are not constantly reminding students to stay on task. Students are able to have their bags with them in classrooms.

Attendance: Every school day students should be at school engaged in their learning so they are able to develop their knowledge, skills and understanding and strive to reach their potential. If a student is sick, their parent or care provider needs to give a written explanation and or a medical certificate to the school the first day they return. The reason for an absence from school cannot be changed after 7 days from the absence. If a written explanation is not received or the reason is not valid, eg getting a haircut, then the absence is recorded as unjustified. I understand that there are circumstances where a parent or care provider needs to ask for permission for leave, for example, attending a funeral. Please do this in writing, addressed to the Principal, prior to the student being absent. If a student needs to attend an appointment, eg with a doctor or specialist, please attach the appointment card to the note as supporting evidence. Family holidays will no longer qualify for an exemption from school. These will be granted under the leave provision and will count as absences from school. Please note that students cannot be paid to work during school hours.

Achievement in Literacy and Numeracy: Our data has shown an upward trend in student achievement in Literacy and Numeracy however we are continuing to work together to ensure this continues. We have introduced a whole school approach to writing called ALARM which stands for A Learning and Responding Matrix. This is a scaffold that helps students answer extended response questions. It helps students order their thoughts and gives them a structure for the response. We have also been working with students on their understanding of tier two words to support their writing. All staff are also explicitly teaching the numeracy requirements of their subjects.

Student learning culture: Students need to be actively engaged in their learning to achieve subject specific learning outcomes and to progress along the learning continuum. Learning is a dynamic process and it needs to be continually practiced. This year we continue with the Learning Hub, which is a space for students to access a Learning and Support teacher and or an SLSO before school and recess. We have continued the High Potential and Gifted Education classes in years 7, 8, 9 and 10 and all students are encouraged to enter academic competitions and opportunities presented by the school. We utilise remedial strategies through our Learning and Support Teachers, Mrs Tanya Macgregor, Mrs Shani Harigan (currently in maternity leave) and Mrs Hayley Tattersall. We have Student Learning Support Officers (SLSOs) who also work within classrooms to help and support our students with their learning. Our class teachers are more than happy to encourage and support our students and are often spending time with students at recess and lunch helping students with their work. Our Positive Behavior for Learning (PBL) program explicitly teaches students the behavior expectations of our school which are to be safe, respectful and responsible.

School uniform: Our uniform is endorsed by our Parents and Citizens Association. They have worked tirelessly to ensure that our school uniform is sophisticated, functional and ensures students comply with safety regulations. Wearing school uniform gives students a sense of belonging to our school. Many items of our school uniform are now available through our front office. If parents or care providers are having difficulties in purchasing our school uniform please contact me at school.

P&C Meeting: Our first P&C Meeting for 2023 will be held in the Conference Room (just along the corridor from the front office) on Tuesday 28 February at 7.30 pm. This is the AGM for our P&C. I look forward to seeing all our new and continuing parents.


