Six students participated in the Australian National Chemistry Quiz in July this year. This is an international competition testing students on their knowledge of chemistry.



Important Attendance Information

Every school day students should be at school engaged in their learning so they are able to develop their knowledge, skills and understanding and strive to reach their potential. If a student is sick, their parent or care provider needs to give a written explanation and or a medical certificate to the school the first day they return or contact the school the day of the absence. The reason for an absence from school cannot be changed after 7 days from the absence. If a written explanation is not received or the reason is not valid, eg getting a haircut, then the absence is recorded as unjustified.

I understand that there are circumstances where a parent or care provider needs to ask for permission for leave, for example, attending a funeral. Please do this in writing, addressed to the Principal, prior to the student being absent.

If a student needs to attend an appointment, eg with a doctor or specialist, please attach the appointment card to the note as supporting evidence. Family holidays will no longer qualify for an exemption from school. These will be granted under the leave provision and will count as absences from school. Please note that students cannot be paid to work during school hours.

DARE To Eat Pizza In Your Pyjamas With Poltergeists!

This term the English faculty and the Library have worked on developing a new reading program, DARE, to lift our reading skills. NAPLAN data and Minimum Skills testing has shown that we all need to read more, and research tells us that success in life after school is more likely if we read.

DARE is about daring to read, daring to read more, daring to read something different. Students have a reading lesson in the Library one period per cycle. The aim is to read for pleasure, to change to a culture where reading is valued for itself, and its real benefits understood. Reading goals for each student are determined by current reading levels, which we are all aiming to lift together. We have begun with Year 7, and we will work toward refining these goals for individual students next term, extending the program to all students in Years 7-9 over the next year.

Year 7 students who met their reading goals during weeks 5-9 this term were rewarded with a Pyjamas, Pizzas and Poltergeists night in the Library last Thursday.



With only candles for lighting, students played a ghostly trivia quiz while eating pizza and sat in a storytelling circle to share tales of ghosts. Some students created a creepy tale on the spot, others recounted real-life spooky experiences, and one student had researched and read out historical accounts of ghosts in Parkes. Our English teachers also told fascinating stories about ghosts they knew! We finished with a classic episode of *Around the Twist*, **The Skeleton on the Dunny**. Congratulations to those students who met their reading goals this term – a supernatural effort!!

HSC Minimum Standards – Year 10 Students

If you are sitting your HSC exams in or after 2020 you will need to meet a <u>minimum standard of literacy and numeracy</u> to receive your Higher School Certificate.

Literacy and numeracy skills are key for success in everyday life. Achieving the HSC minimum standard means you will have a <u>level of skills</u> necessary for success after school.

Students show they have met the HSC minimum standard by passing <u>online tests</u> of basic reading, writing and numeracy skills needed for everyday tasks. The minimum standard online tests are not based on NAPLAN.

Students master basic skills at different stages so there are multiple opportunities available for students to <u>understand</u> what to expect and pass the minimum standard online tests, from Year 10 until a few years after Year 12.

Some students will be eligible for <u>disability provisions for the minimum standard tests</u>, or an exemption from the HSC minimum standard requirement.

Important changes to the HSC minimum standard

From last year, <u>Year 9 NAPLAN tests will no longer be available as an early way for students to demonstrate the standard</u>. This change has been made to ensure NAPLAN remains focussed on its diagnostic purpose and to reduce unnecessary stress on young people.

FACT SHEET

You need reading, writing and maths skills to be successful in everyday life after school. That's why you're required to show a minimum standard of literacy and numeracy to receive the Higher School Certificate (HSC) from 2020.

To check you have the basics right, you need to sit short online tests of reading, writing and maths for everyday life.

You get two chances a year to pass each of the tests from Year 10 until a few years after the HSC. Your school will help you decide when you are ready to take each test.

If you pass the online tests of basic reading, writing and numeracy skills you will show you've met the HSC minimum standard.

HOW IS THE STANDARD SET?

The standard is set at level 3 of the Australian Core Skills Framework (ACSF), which means students will have the basic reading, writing and maths skills needed for everyday tasks and future learning after school. If includes skills for tasks such as:

Following safety instructions in equipment manuals

O Understanding a mobile phone plan

Writing a job application

Creating a personal weekly budget.

The HSC minimum standard is part of a plan to ensure students have essential interacy and numeracy skills.

- pass the online reading test or have achieved Band 8 or above in reading in Year 9 NAPLAN in 2017 AND
- cass the online writing test or have achieved Band 8 or above in writing in Year 9 NAPLAN in 2017 AND
- pass the online numeracy test or have achieved Band 8 or above in numeracy in Year 9 NAPLAN in 2017.


You need to meet the HSC minimum standard to receive the HSC. To show you meet the standard you need to:

- * pass the online reading test AND
- · pass the online writing test AND
- · pase the online numeracy test.



Some students with disabilities will be eligible for extra provisions for the minimum standard online tests, or be exempt from meeting the HSC minimum standard in order to receive their HSC.
